





2018 INU Student Seminar for Global Citizenship and Peace Summary Report

The INU Student Seminar for Global Citizenship and Peace is a 9 day program for highly motivated undergraduate and graduate students from INU member institutions who are interested in learning about global citizenry and peace. Each year a specific topic is selected and activates culminates in a United Nations (UN) General Assembly role-play.

The 2018 Student Seminar focused on the theme of Food and Water Insecurity in our globalised world. The student seminar is scheduled to take place concurrently with the Peace Memorial Ceremony at Hiroshima, Japan on 6th August 2018. The seminar included expert speakers from INU member institutions. 78 students from 10 INU member institutions attended the program along with 13 staff facilitating in the 2018 Student Seminar.

In addition, there is also a cultural program in Hiroshima City, which builds up to a United Nations General Assembly role-play. Students



represented member states in engaging with the United Nations Declaration. In 1947 the UN established the right of all to adequate food, and in 2010 access to clean drinking water and sanitation were declared human rights. Students visited the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum and listened to the personal account of Hibakusha (A-bomb survivor) Ms. Keiko Ogura and attended the annual Peace Memorial Ceremony. This program was hosted by Hiroshima University in Japan.

Full-time students at INU member universities can now win the chance to study abroad by applying for the 2018 Henry Fong Award for Global Citizenship and Peace. The award comprises a scholarship to study for a maximum of one semester at another INU member university without the need to pay tuition fees at the hosting university. A stipend of \$1,500 (GBP) is given to support travel costs and living expenses. A winner will be agreed by a panel of INU academic staff from the seminar.
